


## Foreword

"My Voice is Your Voice" is a poster competition promoted by the Italian Agency for Development Cooperation (AICS) - Khartoum Regional Office.

This initiative is a part of the "WE-RISE!" project, a collaborative effort between AICS and UN Women, funded by the European Union Emergency Trust Fund for Africa. The project's goal is to support Sudan's democratic transition by empowering vulnerable women in Kassala, Gedaref, and Red Sea States.

The competition aimed to actively engage the Sudanese community in the "16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence 2023" under the theme "My Voice is Your Voice." A jury comprising five experts in gender issues, communication, and graphic design selected the 12 best posters presented in this publication. These works creatively and meaningfully addressed various challenges faced by Sudanese women and girls, including the impact of the ongoing conflict.


## STOP Gender Violence!

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




# Volume Up!

# Rising Up!


Rising Up! You are an unstoppable force, and because of you, everything is thriving! This poster serves as a profound encouragement, celebrating the innate strength of women.

# Three Butterflies



The legacy of these brave women lives on. They sacrificed their lives for a more equal society, where men and women could be treated the same. The Mirabal Sisters were brutally murdered on November 25, 1960, under the dictatorship of Rafael Leonidas Trujillo. Minerva Mirabal became a leader and authority in the struggle for equal rights, in a country of no

It is estimated that more than 50,000 men and women were killed in what is considered one of the cruelest Latin American dictatorships in history. To achieve this, methods of persecution, torture and imprisonment were used.

Las Mariposas, as the Mirabal sisters were known, became politically involved, demonstrated, formed a political party and made their demand for a more just society felt. Thousands upon thousands of

On November 25, 1960, in the Dominican Republic, the Mirabal sisters - Patria, Minerva and Maria Teresa "Las tres Mariposas" - fell victim to a tragic fate by order of the dictator Trujillo. In honor of their memory, the United Nations has designated this date as the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women. This work aims to commemorate the inspiring legacy of the Mirabal sisters, as a symbol of resilience, leadership and determination in the relentless pursuit of justice. The choice to remember this tragic event not only honors the broken lives of the Mirabals, but highlights the need for a collective commitment to end violence against women and promote a society based on principles of equity and respect.

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



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
